Privacy and confidentiality

Maintaining peoples privacy and confidentiality is a **must**.

No one wants to find that their personal details have been shared without their consent, and there may be legal consequences for disclosing someone's information without consent.

It is important to refrain from discussing people you assist in the project with anyone other than your supervisor or a health professional already involved in that persons care.

There are exceptions. You may be required to disclose information due to legal or safety reasons. If you are unsure check with your supervisor.

Supporting the carers

Carer stress impacts the carer, the person they are caring for, and sometimes other people in their community

Supporting you the volunteer

If you don't feel comfortable for any reason you can still support the person by getting someone else who can be there for them. You can ask another volunteer, or go to Neighbourhood House for support. You can access CHRH employee assistance program. Neighbourhood Centre manager will ensure you get to debrief, please let them know what's happening.

Support is here for you

If you are challenged or have a distressing event, or are just feeling a bit overwhelmed, make sure you chat with your supervisor, or utilise the Employee Assistance Program which is available for people from Central Highlands Rural Health.



My Aged Care (MAC)

My Aged Care (MAC) is here to help people to stay in their own home by providing support if people need it.

If the person you are supporting is 65 years or older, 50 years or older for Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people, and they need help at home, in the community, assistance around aged care, respite or allied health therapy, My Aged Care might be appropriate.

To contact My Aged Care Call 1800 200 422 or visit www.myagedcare.gov.au

If the person you are supporting needs help to contact My Aged Care call 1800 200 422. The My Aged Care staff can talk you through the process – they can arrange an assessment. They will need some information from the person. The person needs to be with you to give the My Aged Care staff permission to talk to you.

You will need a private space, a phone with a speaker, the person with you to give consent, The persons Medicare card, and plenty of time.

If you have difficulties accessing My Aged Care or the person has complex needs, hand over to Neighbourhood House, or Central Highlands Rural Health (Daylesford Reception 5321 6500).

Ask Izzy

Level of support required



Financial, Housing, Food
